The Dobbs Ferry Historical Society welcomes all members and the public to an annual meeting on Sunday, Sept. 29th, in the Community Room of the Library at 153 Main Street (please use the garden entrance on Cedar Street) from 3-5 pm.

A brief business meeting will report to members on the Society's past year, and will include the nomination for re-election of the following slate of five candidates for the Society's Board of Trustee "class of '88": Richard Hazen, Joanne Kavanagh, Martha Schwartz, Henry Walter and John Whiting.

The membership will also be asked to confirm two new Trustees- Anne Graham ('87) and Steve Yarabek ('86)-- to fill Trustee positions vacated by the resignations of Charlie Baiano and Betty Gallagher last spring.

Previously, Officers of the Society's Board have been elected for the year at the annual meeting. This year, the membership will be presented with the following Amendment to the By-Laws, for ratification: Article V, Sec. 1. "Enumeration and Term of Office." "The Officers of the Society shall be a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary and a Treasurer. They shall be elected from among the Trustees, by the Trustees, at the first Board meeting following the annual meeting, for a term of one year."

Following the annual meeting, at about 3:40pm, everyone is invited to stay for a free program, presented by Dr. Cortland P. Auser of Yorktown Heights- Professor of English Literature at Bronx Community College, Trustee of Lower Hudson Conference, and former Yorktown Historian.

NEW YORK FOUNDATION FOR THE ARTS  
ARTIST-IN-RESIDENCY PLANNED  
BY DOBBS FERRY CONSORTIUM



The New York Foundation for the Arts Artist-in-Residence Program has awarded \$6000 in artists' fees and materials for a residency and visiting artists project to a Dobbs Ferry community consortium, coordinated by the Dobbs Ferry Historical Society.

The Schools, the Dobbs Ferry Council for the Arts, and the Historical Society are developing a community-wide program in printmaking and architectural awareness, which will involve a resident printmaker/artist at the High School, visiting artist/lecturer/demonstrators to involve students in sketching/walking tours of Dobbs Ferry architecture and streetscapes and an adult printmaking course for community residents. Artists are being interviewed for the residency program which begins officially in October.

GRANTS AWARDED TO THE HISTORICAL SOCIETY  
FOR 1985-1986 PROGRAMS AND DEVELOPMENT

\* Summer Jobs For Youth, a program of WESCOP and the Corporate Community Jobs Project, granted the Historical Society an intern's stipend for the 8th consecutive summer, this past July. Their grant of \$1000 provided pay for Fordham Prep School junior, Ho Sang Yoon of Mt. Vernon, our summer "public history intern".

Ho Sang has worked full-time this summer, assisting in the Society's office and learning the skills of preparing historic newspapers for preservation micro-filming: research, repair, disbinding and targeting. His steady and careful nature made possible the preparation of 8 volumes (1920-27) of the Dobbs Ferry Register (and an occasional Hastings Echo) during the months of July and August.

\* Last June a letter to the Historical Society from County Executive Andrew P. O'Rourke and County Legislator Edward J. Brady, stated they are "extremely pleased that the County government, in cooperation with the corporate community and the Council for the Arts in Westchester, can help support the important public service provided by your organization." This letter accompanied word of approval for a grant of \$2400 from the Westchester Arts Fund of the Westchester Council for the Arts, representing \$1000 towards administrative development, and \$1400 towards an Irish Roots Exhibit (Spring '86).

On May 10th, Governor Cuomo signed a proclamation designating 1986 as Architectural Heritage Year, as a challenge to New Yorkers "to discover New York and eagerly explore its architectural and cultural history."

On May 18th, the audience attending the 12th Annual Statewide Preservation Conference in Cooperstown, N.Y., was treated to a workshop presentation by Rusty Russell of Dobbs Ferry, on the subject "Images, Images, Images: Photography as a Preservation Tool".

To our delight and pride, Rusty Russell illustrated his talk with the Dobbs Ferry Historical Society's STOREFRONT HISTORY projector, as a good local community example of "programming for preservation."

As a co-sponsor of Architectural Heritage Year 1986, the Historical Society will encourage the building of "architectural literacy" in New York State, through our continuing programs, films, walking tours and slide shows.

We are joining as sponsors in a regional conference on local preservation efforts in architectural interpretation for educators, historians and the lay public, to be held later in the fall at National Registered Estherwood Mansion, on the grounds of the Masters School, Clinton Avenue, Dobbs Ferry. This Hudson valley-wide regional seminar is co-sponsored by the Dobbs Ferry Historical Society, The Masters School, Lower Hudson Conference and the New York State Preservation League.

TWO DOBBS FERRY SITES RECEIVED MARKERS  
AS 60 HISTORICAL SPOTS WERE NOTED BY COUNTY

Two County Tricentennial markers appeared to grace our Little White Church Cemetery and Zion Episcopal Church last April, when these sites were selected by a committee of the Westchester County Tricentennial Commission. Thanks to village co-historian, Sr. Mary Agnes Parrell, who supplied documentary information to Barry Samuels, Deputy Commissioner of County Parks and Preservation.





Faces, facades, celebrations, signatures, institutional histories, public health records, family memories and more!!

The Historical Society collects and maintains Dobbs Ferry documents, pictures, oral histories, maps, books and memorabilia for the purpose of preserving our village history, interpreting the past, and making local history accessible to the public.

In our modest office, downstairs in the Library at 153 Main Street, we identify, sort and store the following "ingots" of Hudson Rivertown information, with the help of professional archivist Kathleen Brennan, and a group of volunteers:

#### I. DOBBS FERRY SCHOOL DISTRICT ARCHIVES (1890's -1960)

School District #3 is illuminated in the hand-written letters from prospective teachers, seeking jobs here before the turn of the century; graduating class photographs; documentation of the WPA-assisted construction of the "new" Dobbs Ferry High School in the 1930's; attendance and School District Tax Records offer historical "raw material" to our study of a developing village--its people, public health and general composition. The School District Archives are arranged chronologically; tax and attendance records are separate.

#### II. OLD WHITE CHURCH CEMETERY INSCRIPTIONS

Recently awarded a county historical marker, this early 19th century cemetery at 43 Ashford Avenue can be studied from our list of names and records of over 300 gravestone inscriptions.

#### III. NEWSPAPERS ON MICROFILM

A microfilmed collection of the Greenburgh Register and Dobbs Ferry Register newspapers, published in Dobbs Ferry between 1884-1927 (some years are missing, un-available for filming). You can use microfilmed history to research Hudson River genealogy and socio-political history, with weekly references to the villages of Ardsley, Hastings and Irvington, in addition to ads and news of Dobbs Ferry.

#### IV. LOCAL HISTORIES

The archives files contain copies of several versions of Dobbs Ferry history, as seen by a variety of local historians over the years. The over-sized Chamber of Commerce Scrapbook and a 19th century Dobbs Ferry Business Directory offer further verification of the commercial side of Dobbs Ferry development, and are complimented by microfilmed ads from the weekly local newspapers (1884-1927).

#### V. ARCHITECTURE IN DOBBS FERRY

Make a start on architectural research in our partial set of building survey reports, relating to individual structures on Main, Cedar, Palisade Streets; Broadway, Clinton Avenue, and throughout the village.

Our slide and photograph collections also document details of Victorian, Italian vernacular and Outbuilding architecture in the village. A separate slide study collection reveals the diversity of 19th and 20th century stained glass in Dobbs Ferry- secular and religious, documented and anonymous.

#### VI. ORAL HISTORIES ON TAPE

Oral histories of Dobbs Ferry residents are contained in over 100 cassette-housed interviews, with a special concentration on Italian families. A new study of Irish Roots in Dobbs Ferry is expected to increase this collection during 1986.

#### VII. PHOTOGRAPHS

We are preparing to catalogue several hundred photos donated to the Historical Society by the family of the late David Ravekes, who lived almost all of his 100 years in Dobbs Ferry. Initial sorting and identification has been accomplished thanks to the efforts of Anna and Ruth King. Photos in our collections document people, places and events. These will be arranged, and preserved in acid-free boxes, by size.

#### VIII. "MYSTERIOUS" MISCELLANY"

A sense of adventure and a few hours of free time will take you far in solving archival mysteries with our archivist on Thursdays, between 10-4, in our office. Please remember the Historical Society Archives when you find you can volunteer a few hours a week. Individual research questions are referred through our Trustee/ Research Chairman, Anne Graham. Archives training is available through the archivist.

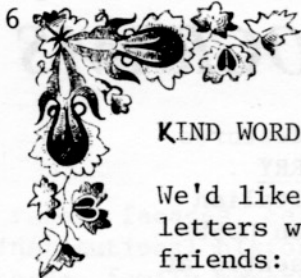

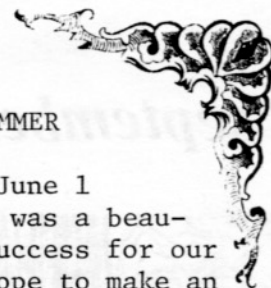

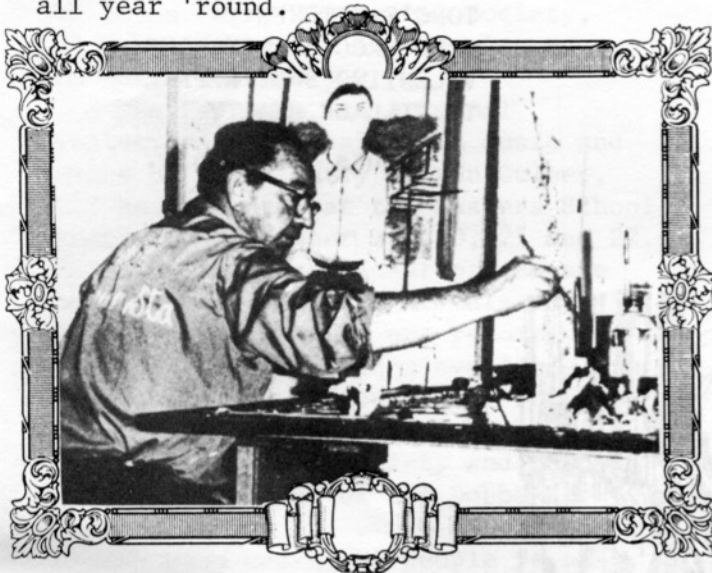
MORGAN PRESS AIDS SOCIETY

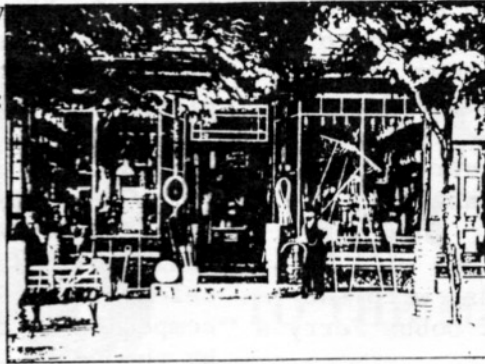
